



Gary, a Wiradjuri man originally from Parkes NSW, has spent the majority of his days in Campbelltown. A proud father, grandfather and a devoted husband to his loving wife Debbie, Gary has been a leader in Aboriginal Affairs since 1992.

He's held a number of positions on boards and committees in the Campbelltown/ Liverpool areas and is currently employed with the NSW Department of Education, where he performs a crucial role as an Aboriginal Education Specialist. Both Gary and Debbie know firsthand the trials and tribulations that come with being a foster carer; they also know the rewards. They themselves have been foster carers for a number of years.

Gary is honoured to be KARI's Chairperson and is thrilled to see the service grow to become a leader in the field of Aboriginal child protection, prevention and community capacity building.

A founding member of KARI and former CEO, Paul is a proud Aboriginal man with family connections from both the North Coast and South Coast of NSW. For the past 35 years he has lived in Gandangara Country, South West Sydney.

During his professional career, Paul has worked across a number of important Aboriginal portfolios specific to employment outcomes, housing, education and human services. He was awarded the First Peoples award at the Australasian Professional Society on Alcohol and other Drugs (APSAD) conference in Brisbane in 2013.

Stephen is a member of the NSW Health Aboriginal Directors and Managers Strategic Leadership Group and previously lectured at Sydney University as an Adjunct lecturer. Stephen has also

co-authored a handbook for Aboriginal Alcohol and Drug Work and is an Associate Investigator with the Centre of Research Excellence Indigenous Health and Alcohol Research.

Casey is a proud Aboriginal woman with connections to the North and South Coasts of NSW. She has spent the majority of her life living on Gandangara Country in South Western Sydney.


Laurie Daley

Beau Champion



KARI Foundation believes culture can drive change.



Corporate Cultural Immersion Program

Community Cultural Camp

KARI Foundation's Community Cultural Camps have continued to draw young attendees, providing invaluable opportunities for reconnection with their heritage. These camps are carefully designed to empower our young people, offering them a gateway to recognising the richness of their culture.

The youth enjoy activities such as guided visits of significant cultural sites, traditional tool making, traditional arts, stories around the campfire, learning about bush foods and medicines, bushwalks and swimming.

But the heart of our camps is the sense of community they foster, participants find a place where their identity is strengthened, where they can immerse themselves in culture, and where they feel safe and engaged. It's a holistic experience that transcends learning; it's about belonging. nunity and identity



The KARI Foundation's Transition to High School Backpack Program

The KARI Foundation's Transition to High School backpack program is designed for Aboriginal Year 6 students embarking on their journey from primary school to high school. This program recognises the pivotal nature of this transition, aiming to equip students with the essential tools they needed to thrive in their formative high school years.

This year, the KARI Foundation received a significant boost as the Mounties Group came forward to sponsor the Transition to High School backpack program. Their contribution allowed the program to expand its reach and impact.

Schools in the Sydney Metro and South West Sydney regions played a crucial role in the delivery of the backpacks along with the Community Programs Team and the Aboriginal Education team from across the South West region.

Each backpack contained the essential items to thrive in school, such as math sets, stationery, calculators and the like, provided free of charge to eligible students.

Transition to Kindergarten Backpack Program

The Transition to Kindergarten backpack program, supported through a partnership of dedicated organisations, distributed hundreds of free school bags and carefully selected, relevant resources, to nurture skill development and support the sometimes daunting transition of Aboriginal children into kindergarten.

One of the cornerstones of this initiative is the ten-part YouTube video series titled "Getting Ready for School – The Deadly Way." Hosted Aboriginal television and film actor, Luke Carroll, this series provides practical ideas and guidance for parents, caregivers, and young people as they navigate the critical developmental early years leading up to kindergarten.

Luke Carroll, known for his roles in iconic productions, sees this project as an opportunity to give back to his community. He stated, "It's incredibly rewarding to be a part of an initiative that empowers our young people and their families. Education is a powerful tool, and by providing resources and support, we're setting these children on a path to success."

The video series covers a wide range of topics, from developing essential motor skills to fostering a love for reading and numeracy. It also addresses cultural sensitivity, helping young Aboriginal children connect with their heritage as they take their first steps into formal education.


The Cultural Connection

At the core of this initiative is the commitment to providing tailored pathways to employment that align with the career aspirations of Aboriginal students, supplemented by ongoing mentoring and support.

The goal is to maximise retention and ensure successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent, providing clear pathways to secondary school, sustainable employment, and further education and training.

3. Unlocking Local Opportunities

By identifying and securing job placements and opportunities that align with Aboriginal students' career aspirations, the Opportunity Hub bridges the gap between education and employment. It transforms aspirations into concrete steps towards realising dreams.

4. Access to Tertiary Education

The Hub actively engages Aboriginal students and their families, guiding them toward tertiary education and training pathways that align with their career interests. This holistic approach enhances their overall wellbeing and strengthens their cultural connection.





For many students, this was their first exposure to Aboriginal culture. They listened to the Elders' tales and painted their interpretations of ancient stories on canvas. The workshops aim to educate and to foster respect and appreciation for the local Aboriginal community.

Parallel to the cultural journey, the Wests Tigers brought their expertise to the program. Coaches and players visited local schools, transforming the playgrounds into rugby league training grounds. The students were taught the basics of the game – from passing and tackling to team strategies and sportsmanship.

The rugby league clinics became a hub of excitement. Students happily wore their jerseys and ran drills with enthusiasm. The Wests Tigers' presence brought a sense of pride and aspiration, as local youngsters saw their sporting heroes up close.

Cultural exhibitions, showcasing the artwork and craftsmanship of local Aboriginal artists, were held in conjunction with friendly rugby league matches. Many from the community turned out to celebrate this fusion of culture and sport.











Koori Knockout



The under-15 girls from Waterloo Storm showed their dominance against the Gadhu Sisters. The under-15 boys' final was a nail-biter, with La Perouse Panthers edging past Blacktown Red Belly Warriors.

The under-17 categories showcased incredible talent. Cabbage Tree Island's girls emerged victorious, and Blacktown Red Belly Warriors claimed the title for the boys. The women's final was tense, with Dunghutti prevailing over Newcastle Yowies by a slim margin.

The men's final stole the spotlight with an exciting match, the Newcastle All Blacks secured their place in history, defeating the valiant Walgett Aboriginal Connection. The Koori Knockout is not merely a sporting event but a symbol of resilience, pride, and unity. It celebrates Indigenous culture through sport, showcasing the strength, talent, and determination of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander athletes.

The event was a gathering of business leaders from diverse sectors, all with a shared eagerness to delve deeper into the intricacies of Indigenous engagement.


Individuals shared their stories of success, underlining the importance of creating opportunities for Indigenous entrepreneurs and nurturing leadership within the Aboriginal community.






ICC Sydney generously used its media assets to promote the KARI Foundation and NAIDOC Week on the outside of their buildings.


